Top 10 States for LEED Green Buildings: Today, USGBC released its top 10 list of states with the most LEED-certified building square footage per capita. The District of Columbia leads the nation, with more than 31 square feet of LEEDcertified space per person in 2011, and Colorado is the leading state, with 2.74 square feet per person in 2011. Other top states include Illinois, Virginia and Washington, with 2.69, 2.42 and 2.18 square feet of LEED-certified space per person.






- State's jobless rate falls to 8.5% in December: The state's unemployment rate slid to 8.5 percent in December, down 0.2 percentage point from November and the lowest jobless level since February 2009, officials said Friday. But a separate survey of Washington employers suggested the state's economy lost 10,700 jobs last month, led by the professional and business-services sector and the retail sector. The private sector shed 9,500 jobs and the public sector, 1,200 jobs. State officials said they were skeptical of the December job losses.

- Seattle-Snohomish Mill to close; 50 jobs lost: After more than 70 years in business, Seattle-Snohomish Mill will close in March. The mill, which employs 50 people, first opened in Snohomish in 1941. "This is a very difficult decision," Megan McMurray, owner of the mill, said in a statement. "We have a dedicated workforce, some who have been with Seattle-Snohomish Mill Co. Inc. for more than three decades." Mill employees were notified last week that the company would close in 60 days. The collapse of the housing and construction industry was a major factor in the decision to close the Seattle-Snohomish Mill, McMurray said. - Tableau Software plans to add 300 workers in 2012: Seattle-based <u>Tableau Software</u> finished 2011 by growing its customer base by 40 percent and adding 160 employees, nearly doubling its staff and bringing its total to 350. Tableau, which makes business intelligence software has bigger plans for this year. The company, led by former venture capitalist Christian Chabot, said it plans to <u>add 300 employees this year</u>, with a focus on hiring software engineers with experience in interactive analytics, mobile applications, internet scale distributed systems, high-performance graphics, user experience and human-oriented design. A majority of the hires will be in Seattle.

- Average tech salary in Seattle area: \$90+K per year: The average tech salary in the greater Seattle area is now \$90,362 a year, up 5 percent from a year ago. One in three Seattle-based tech professionals said they had received a bonus. The average for 2011 was \$9,892. <u>TechFlash reports</u> that on any given day, there are 2,500 openings for tech jobs posted in the greater Seattle area. And tech job postings have grown each month for the past two years.

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- Microsoft lays off 200 workers; most of them in Seattle area: Microsoft laid off about 200 employees Wednesday as part of a restructuring of its marketing operations. Sources close to the company said that the layoffs — the majority of them in the Seattle area, are aimed at reducing duplication of job responsibilities, clarifying the roles and responsibilities of the company's central marketing team vs. divisional product-marketing groups, and improving the impact of the company's marketing as a whole. - TechNet study: Washington third in 'app economy' jobs: The newly created "app economy" has created approximately 25,000 jobs in the Seattle/Tacoma area. A study released Tuesday (Feb. 7) by TechNet, a bipartisan network of tech CEOs, reported that since 2007, some 466,000 app jobs have been created in the United States. Of those, 6.4 percent were in Washington state - nearly all in the Seattle/Tacoma/Bellevue area. The so-called "app economy," which has exploded in the four years since the introduction of Apple's iPhone, generated an estimated \$20 billion in revenue last year, according to a study by the consulting firms Appnation and Rubinson Partners, Inc. - ATS opens aerospace-repair plant near Paine Field, looks to hire: Airplane maintenance and repair company Aviation Technical Services (ATS) on Thursday opened a new parts-repair facility just south of Boeing's Everett plant, securing 100 skilled mechanics' jobs and making plans to hire another 100 within two years. Boeing last year took over one of ATS' large buildings at the other end of Paine Field to do rework on 787 Dreamliners. That meant the Everettbased business needed a new facility for its parts work. Chief Executive Matt Yerbic said ATS looked nationally for the best location, but the depth of the aerospace industry in Snohomish County persuaded him to keep the work at Paine Field. - Heinz closing Kent food-processing plant in March: Food-products company H.J. Heinz said Friday it will close its factory in Kent March 30. The plant, which makes frozen soups for restaurant operators, employs about 100, Heinz said. In a statement, the Pittsburgh-based company attributed the closure to "the difficult conditions in which the company is operating," and said it was part of a plan, announced in November, to shut down three factories. Heinz did not elaborate. But the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette reported in November that the company's Foodservice division, which includes the Kent plant, has suffered from commodity price increases and lackluster dining-out trends. Achir has been waiting tables in the Space Needle restaurant for five years. Upon graduation, he plans first to seek a job at Boeing, then later earn a bachelor's degree and work his way up. "Waiting tables my whole life is not my goal," said Achir. Achir was among the audience inside the hangar Tuesday as King County Executive Dow Constantine unveiled plans for local government to support and promote the local aerospace industry, which is expected to supply the region's best manufacturing jobs in the decade ahead. 




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- Amazon to buy Denny Triangle property; plans 3 big office towers: In one of Seattle's biggest real-estate deals in years, fast-growing Amazon.com has agreed to buy three blocks in Seattle's Denny Triangle and preliminary paperwork has been filed with the city to build a 1 million-square-foot office tower on each of them. The properties have been owned for decades by Seattle's Clise family, which signed a purchase-and-sale agreement with Amazon several weeks ago, Clise Properties Chairman Al Clise said late Wednesday. The deal includes options for Amazon to buy even more of Clise's extensive Denny Triangle holdings, he added. "In terms of economic development and new jobs for Seattle, this is off the charts," Clise said. 
