

Jobless rate declines in King, Snohomish and Pierce counties: Unemployment rates fell in King, Snohomish and Pierce counties in September over the previous month, state officials said Tuesday. King County's non-seasonally adjusted jobless rate declined to 6.9 percent from 7.4 percent, Snohomish 7.6 percent from 8.3, and Pierce 8.5 percent from 9.1, according to the state Employment Security Department. The broad-based decline mirrored the state's drop to 7.7 percent from 8.5 percent.

Semiahmoo Hotel in Blaine plans to shut down Dec. 1: The Semiahmoo Hotel in Blaine is planning to shut down on Dec. 1, putting 200 people out of work at the city's largest employer. <u>The Bellingham Herald reports</u> Blaine officials called the announcement "like a nuclear bomb," as the Upper Skagit Indian Tribe, majority owner of the hotel, tries to find a buyer for the hotel. The hotel generates \$200,000 in annual hotel tax money and generates \$125,000 to \$150,000 a year in sales tax for Blaine's general fund. Semiahmoo Golf & Country Club and Loomis Trail Golf Club will remain open after the hotel closes.

This is the first of five tanker integration labs to be operating by the end of 2013. Four will be at Boeing Field in Seattle and one in Everett. Boeing will use the labs to develop, integrate and test the various military systems on the airplane, including the refueling boom, which will be assembled at a Boeing Field facility. Denny Triangle apartment sale sets record: Aspira, a 37-story Denny Triangle apartment tower completed in 2010, was sold Thursday for what one researcher says is the highest price ever for an apartment project in King County. Developer Harbor Urban was paid about \$165.7 million for the 325-unit building, according to county records. That tops the \$164 million Equity Residential paid for downtown's 730-unit Harbor Steps in 2005, said Mike Scott, of Dupre + Scott Apartment Advisors. The Aspira deal breaks down to about \$510,000 per unit. That's also a record, Scott said, easily surpassing the old record of about \$418,000 per unit. (See figure X, page 11)

Windstar Cruises reports 60 percent increase in advanced bookings: Seattle-based Windstar Cruises has reported a 60 percent increase in advanced bookings for 2013 over last year and says that 2013 will mark the fourth straight year of increasing revenue, based on the current pace. After its former parent company, Ambassadors International, <u>filed for bankruptcy</u>, the small-ship luxury cruise line <u>was purchased</u> by Xanterra Parks and Resorts in May 2011 and has since been undergoing big changes. Windstar has invested \$18 million in a fleet-wide renovation project scheduled to be complete by December. The renovation will upgrade the line's three yachts with new décor, carpeting, upholstery, furniture and artwork and replace 72,000 square feet of sails. FAA OKs new flights paths for Sea-Tac landings: A new way to land planes at Seattle-Tacoma International Airport received final approval from the Federal Aviation Administration on Thursday. The method, part of the FAA's Greener Skies Over Seattle program, will use satellite-guided technology to change and streamline flight paths as soon as spring 2013, an FAA spokesman said. The FAA expects the program to improve safety, make flights more fuel-efficient and direct planes over fewer Seattle neighborhoods. Instead of arrivals descending in a stair-step pattern as they now do, jets using Greener Skies' NextGen technology would begin descent closer to the airport and descend smoothly, powering down into what's called flight idle mode.

"We're seeing an incredible amount of excitement, in all sectors of the industry, about the possibilities of recapitalization," said <u>Peter Philips</u>, president of Seattle Marine Business Coalition, an industry advocacy group. Superior crop, increased demand for Washington apples: Washington apple shippers and packers say this year's fresh apple crop will reach record highs despite early worries about hail damage and not enough pickers. The apple crop is expected to hit 121.5 million boxes, according to a recent poll by Yakima Valley Growers-Shippers Association. That number of 40-pound boxes is what Jon DeVaney, the association's executive director, said they estimate based on what packers have in storage. It reflects the apples they think will be packed for fresh market, and does not include apples for processing. The nationwide shortage of apples has spiked demand for Washington's fruit, DeVaney said. "We had a good perfect storm of crop size and market demand," he said.


Seattle will host NCAA tournament games in 2015: After a long hiatus, March Madness is coming back to Seattle. KeyArena will host second- and third-round games of the 2015 NCAA men's basketball tournament on March 20 and 22. It's the first time the tournament has played games in Seattle since 2004. The NCAA has in recent years awarded preliminary-round games to other cities in the Northwest, including those with smaller venues than KeyArena. Organizers in Seattle said it has been difficult to obtain the NCAA games because the 17,072-seat arena, which underwent a \$74.5 million renovation in 1995, has an image problem nationally. "Everybody in this country wants these events, so when you have 50 cities bidding on these slots you can't just put in a good bid, you can't just show you can do a good job, you have to show you can do a great job," said Ralph Morton, executive director of the Seattle Sports Commission. *Source: The Seattle Times, November 12, 2012*

Mixed message in Seattle area's latest home-price data: Home prices in the Seattle metropolitan area rose 3.4 percent in August over the same month last year — the fourth straight monthly year-over-year increase and largest since the housing market collapsed five years ago, according to the closely watched Standard & Poor's/Case-Shiller home-price index. But the news for Seattle was mixed: It was the only one of 20 cities tracked to see prices slip between July and August. The 0.1 percent decline came after five straight month-over-month gains. The Seattle metropolitan area includes King, Snohomish and Pierce counties. Indexes for all 20 cities were released Tuesday. The August numbers are the most recent ones available.

Seattle office market stabilizes: Some researchers say Seattle's office-vacancy rate fell during the summer. Others say it rose. They all agree, however, it didn't change much during the third quarter. And that's a change in itself. The vacancy rate had been dropping, sometimes impressively, for about two years as tenants gobbled up space that emptied — or, in newer buildings, never filled — during the recession. But brokers and other observers don't sound particularly worried about the fairly lackluster third-quarter numbers.

Home sales rise while inventory plummets in October: Plenty of buyers. Not so many sellers. House sales surged in King County in October, while the number of houses on the market dropped to its lowest level since at least 1999, according to statistics released Monday by the Northwest Multiple Listing Service. Buyers closed on 1,981 single-family homes last month, 33 percent more than in October 2011 and — perhaps more surprisingly — 10 percent more than in September of this year. Sales volume usually peaks in the summer and tails off in the fall. The surge also was reflected in pending sales, a less reliable measure of market activity. In Seattle, in-city land for apartments is selling at eye-popping prices: It's not only apartment buildings that are trading hands for sky-high prices in Seattle. The cost of developable land also is way up. <u>Last month, a site for a 105-unit project at 1100 E. Madison St.</u> on Capitol Hill sold for \$8.1 million, said <u>Pete Shelton</u>, the Cushman & Wakefield Commerce broker who represented the sellers. That price works out to \$77,140 per apartment. Public records show that another project site on Capitol Hill, this one for an 89-unit development at 1530 11th Ave., sold last spring for just under \$6.7 million, or \$75,270 per apartment. The Wolff Company, of Scottsdale, Arizona, bought the property from Pryde + Johnson of Seattle.


